Potential Conflict of Interest Guidelines

Panelists understand they are being asked to provide objective advice to the sponsor based on their expertise, experience and/or professional background. Therefore, each panelist must determine, in advance of accepting an assignment, whether an actual conflict exists or whether one might be created by the panelist accepting an assignment. Obvious conflicts include panelists currently under contract or being considered for a contract with a competing public agency or private developer/investor on a directly competing development or issue in a competitive location.

Panelists agree not to directly market their services to the sponsor for a period of six months following completion of the panel assignment. ULI does not intend to preclude sponsors from utilizing the services of ULI members on future work for the sponsor. However, if a sponsor should approach a panelist regarding future work for the sponsor after a panel assignment is completed, ULI requests that the panelist notify the Real Estate Advisory Committee Chair(s) from the ULI Boston District Council to verify that the panelist's potential involvement with the sponsor in no way impacts the integrity of the Technical Advisory Program.
